

ADVENT AND CHRISTMAS

Yes, this weekend we start our new Church year, and as we begin again examining what our faith means to us, we reflect first on the goal to which we believe it leads us, our motivation in following this narrow path. Then, in a few weeks time we will be celebrating Christmas, the time when God the Father began to reveal himself to us in the life of Jesus.

Of course we want to celebrate that, this year even more than other years because of all the distress that the pandemic has caused. Despite all that is distressing, there is much for Christians to celebrate as we recognize each other as children adopted by God into his family by giving us Jesus as our brother. At this time especially we want to celebrate as families, the gift that each of its members contribute to its family life. God has indeed blessed our families, and we don't forget him or his love for all he has created. It was to save creation (of which we are part) that he sent his Son, Jesus. We haven't always recognized this, and so we need to repent and change our ways of celebration.

Can we show our love for each other by being less lavish and by giving priority to someone who really needs our care? This is a matter, not of charity, but of justice, and though we know that we cannot help all the charities that appeal to us, generosity is called for as we have received so much. The joy that this will give us will then flow naturally into the New Year. Sadly some will be disappointed as they won't understand why their unrealistic expectations will not have been met. For this reason some compromises will have to be made because we don't want our children to think they are not as much loved as others. In this families need to support each other.
